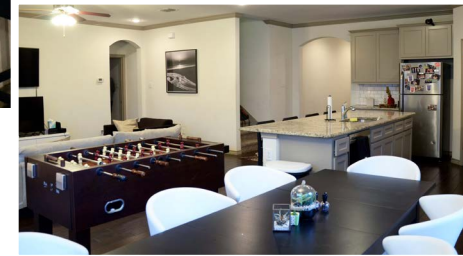

DIFFERENCES IN LIVING OFF CAMPUS

HOW TO DETERMINE IF YOU SHOULD LIVE OFF CAMPUS

Monthly Budget

Establish your monthly budget for rent, utilities and living expenses (internet, cable, groceries, etc.). This is a great place to start when looking for off-campus living.

House or Apartment

Determine which is best for you. An apartment requires less maintenance, but lacks the space and privacy of a home.

Proximity to Campus

Generally, the closer to campus you get, the more expensive your rent will be. If your place is further away, it also takes away some flexibility to go home in the middle of the day.

Requirements

Know how many bedrooms and baths you want, along with your desired size, location and included amenities. All of these factors will play into how much your rent will be.

Timeframe

Decide how long you plan to stay at your new home. Keep in mind that once you sign a lease, you are locked in. Sub-leases may not always be allowed.
